

DESERT HEALTHCARE DISTRICT/DESERT HEALTHCARE FOUNDATION

The Desert Healthcare District started in 1948 as Desert Hospital District with the support of local and state advocates to build a Palm Springs hospital because western valley residents had to drive great distances to receive essential and extensive healthcare services. With the construction of Desert Hospital, the operation and management of the new nonprofit hospital were the focus of the Desert Hospital District Board. As the community grew and with the advent of air-conditioning making year round comfortability, so did the demand for hospital services. More service

> required more staff and funding which was a daunting challenge for the District Board. Fortunately, fundraising efforts were buoyed by the hospital's location in Palm Springs which was a preferred getaway for major entertain-

ers. Frank Sinatra corralled some of his powerful friends, including Sammy Davis Jr., Dean Martin and

others, to support the hospital with their checkbooks and their talent. Some of them performed on stage with Sinatra at fundraising benefits. In 1967, the Desert Hospital Foundation was formed to further support the hospital's activities and had a board of directors separate from the Desert Hospital District Board. With costly and necessary building expansions as well as changing requirements for governmental payment support for patients, the operational and patient needs outpaced fundraising. In 1997, the Desert Hospital Board voted to lease the hospital to Tenet Health Systems for 30 years. Tenet would operate and manage the property as a for-profit hospital while the appropriately renamed Desert Healthcare District retained ownership. Thus, the Foundation essentially lost its job of fundraising for the hospital and became the Desert Healthcare Foundation. Its focus turned to supporting several community programs to provide help to those who needed assistance. In 2003, the Foundation Board was dissolved and the District Board assumed responsibility. In 2004 the development and incubations of two health needs programs were added under the Foundation: The Wellness Park, a five-acre fitness park owned by the District and adjacent to DRMC; HARC (Health Assessment Resource Center), a central resource for information and statistics about the health status of the community and its residents. In 2005, the Board of Directors gave directions to spin off all Foundation programs to existing nonprofit entities or to new start-up nonprofits. Operational support of one to two years was part of the spin-off. In 2012, the Desert Healthcare Foundation revised its bylaws and articles of incorporation to allow for support of healthcare and wellness services and programs across the entire Coachella Valley. While the Foundation exists as a fundraising arm for the Healthcare District and as an incubator of health and support programs, the District primarily operates as a grant-making agency that connects residents to services and programs through philanthropy, facilities, community education and public policy. In 2019, the agency was



rebranded as the Desert Healthcare District and Foundation with one Board consisting of seven elected officials after its geographic boundaries were expanded the year before to cover the entire Coachella Valley.

AIR GOES SKY HIGH UPGRADES AT CCC



Twenty-eight years ago, when the Comprehensive Cancer Center (CCC) was completed, cool air units topped off the roof. That was 1995 and those units have finally been replaced with four new ones. Many of you noticed a huge crane in the Valet lot for about two weeks. This was a special rig designed to reach the top of the CCC from' below ground and lift the four "elderly" units off their moorings and onto the flat bed trucks; then lifting the new units, weighing 15,000 pounds each, into place. There were still air conditioning units on the west drive providing circulation while the new units were married to their ducts. That ground unit blocked the west lane of the CCC drive to the main hospital entrance. Fortunately, by December 10, the new units were installed, the blockage was gone and traffic resumed as normal with both lanes open. Visitors, patients and staff at the CCC can now enjoy dependable comfort, year round.





In July of 1995, when AIDS was the leading cause of death in America for people ages 25-55, a group of 25-30 dedicated volunteers led by Guy Lawson, opened the first Special Care Unit designed to improve hospital care for AIDS patients in Riverside County at Desert Hospital (which later became Desert Regional Medical Center). Guy, who was the volunteer coordinator for the Unit, worked with the hospital to develop and design theme rooms. The hospital virtually turned the

3-East into a "home away from home" for the seriously ill. Many benefactors, interior designers and businesses answered his call to help create this unique setting. The Unit included a staff

idea over to Guy who requested donations and materials to transform

of doctors, nurses, social workers, therapists and volunteers, all of whom asked to work with AIDS patients. The entire staff were trained and educated in the most current treatment of AIDS and the volunteers had to complete

a special 40 hour training program. It opened with 10 beds and expanded to 20 beds. It had a recreational area and a common living room. The patient rooms had refrigerators, comfortable chairs, folding beds, mini sofas and VCRs. They were large enough to hold family members and/or friends who wished to spend the night...including pets The theme rooms ranged from the whimsical cowboy room, the Judy room (Wizard of Oz motif), Cape Cod room, circus room, sunflower room, southwest room, etc.

At that time the Coachella Valley had the second highest rate of HIV infection after San Francisco with slightly more than 2,000 AIDS cases in Riverside County, 70% in the Coachella Valley. Guy worked at the Unit 60-80 hours a week saying "It's the little things we can do as volunteers to make a difference".
