

GIFT SHOP UPDATE

The Gift Shop is undergoing some changes. Like many businesses, the Gift Shop experienced a decline in sales during the pandemic. However, we have now recovered to pre-pandemic sales levels and are in a position to implement changes that were put on hold during the downturn. The first change will involve installing a new credit card terminal in the Gift Shop. This installation will be completed by October 10. We have planned to carry out this change while the Gift Shop is closed, ensuring that our normal hours will remain unaffected. One of the reasons for this upgrade is to enable us to accept a wider range of credit cards and touchless payments such as Apple Pay. This change is just the first step in a larger plan to replace the current point of sale (POS) system. The new system we are evaluating promises to be much faster and far more reliable. Additionally, it includes an advanced feature that allows it to process credit and debit card sales even when online banking services are unavailable. Furthermore, the new system will come with a portable register, enabling us to extend the Gift Shop's full checkout process to other locations for events such as those held in the lobby, the cafeteria or the Sinatra Education Center. Once again, Eddie has brought some amazing merchandise into the Gift Shop.

NEW GENERAL SURGERY RESIDENCY PROGRAM

Desert Regional Medical Center (DRMC), the only Level 1 Trauma Center in the Desert, is home to a dedicated staff and an administration which supports medical education and affords its residents with research and much more. On July 1, DRMC instituted its new General Surgery Residency Program. This new Graduate Medical Education (GME) joins the fellowship and residency programs already in place. Under the guidance of Program Director, Daniel Ludi, M.D., the program welcomed six new residents, three as first year students and three as second year students: Lauren Anderson, M.D., Jeremy Miller, M.D., Sebastian Shu-Yip, M.D., Danielle Azani, M.D., Austin Henker, D,O., Daniel Margain, M.D. Four are from the U.S. and one each from Canada and Mexico. Hospital staff, especially the nurses, are very excited. Dr. Ludi commented, "We are exceeding our expectations and the opportunity to impact our communities in a positive way." Dr. Ludi, originally from Argentina, has many years of teaching experience and has taught much of the GME faculty at DRMC. "I am very excited to bring this program here to te desert and create a culture that is about the community," he said. The program is designed to include additional residents over the nex two years to reach a total of 15. Because of the diversity of our patients and the opportunity to work at a Level 1 Trauma Center, DRMC provides a unique and appealing experience which has made it a top destination for many young physicians during their residencies. It is exciting to witness the birth of this special program and to be a part of the elevated degree of regional care that only DRMC, the "Center of Excellence" in the Coachella Valley can offer.

COMPREHENSIVE CANCER CENTER



The Comprehensive Cancer Center, located in the El Mirador Building on the DRMC campus is indeed "comprehensive". With over 60,000 sg.ft. of space, the Center, accredited by the American College of Surgeons Commission on Cancer, provides programs and services for the detection, diagnosis. treatment, support and follow-up care for people with cancer. The Center features advanced technology in a patient friendly environment and includes a multidisciplinary award-winning team of physicians, nurses, technologists and support staff. The CCC opened at the DAP building in 1990. Two

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years later, ground was broken at the El Mirador Medical Plaza on the campus of DRMC. Additionally, in 1994, the Center opened the Valley's first Comprehensive Breast Center. One year later, the Valley's first Surgical Oncology program was established. The Center celebrated its first phase opening in the new \$28 million facility in 1998. Fast forward to 2008 and the Center received the Commission on Cancer Outstanding Achievement Award. Only 19% of 478 cancer

programs achieve that recognition. In 2011, a new 6,000 sq. ft. satellite office was opened in La Quinta to afford the East Valley many of the same disciplines available at DRMC. Finally, in 2015, an additional 2,000 sq ft. extension to the La Quinta facility was opened. In 2016, the Valley's first TrueBeam linear accelerator for radiation therapy was added at the CCC. 2020 saw a

30-years of service to the community celebration. As if all available cancer options was not enough, 13 additional support programs are now available from Advanced Wound Healing to Yoga, Art Therapy, Tai Chi. Reiki,

a wig boutique (wigs are free of charge to patients), Pet and Music Therapy, plus more. Under the direction of Executive Director Teresa Whipple, CCC truly represents the best and most comprehensive center of its kind in the Valley. Thank you to its

outstanding staff!





Charlie Farrell, Mary Pickford, Lionel Barrymore, Gilbert Roland, Cary Grant, Monty Montana, Charlie Chaplin, Gary Cooper, Lucille Ball, Ralph Bellamy, Spencer Tracy, Salvador Dali, John Wayne, H.G. Wells, Ava Gardner and Frank Sinatra were some of the guests who played in the "Hotel's Sandbox" and swam in the famous Olympic size swimming pool. Johnny Weissmuller (Tarzan of the Jungle), who won the Olympic gold medal for swimming in 1932, stayed at the Hotel and practiced in the pool. Olympic medal diver,

Schultz Smith also swam in the Hotel's pool. Actors Jackie Cooper and Bonita Granville were seen kissing at the bottom of the Hotel's pool. (Remember there was an underwater window!) The Hotel and pool truly earned its title of "Sandbox and Playground of the Stars"!
